The primary objective of this degree program is to develop well-versed professionals in the field of linguistics and literature who can investigate language-related issues and understand the importance of social and cultural values that shape the contemporary world.


Each student is required to complete 65-hour of community work, usually after 1^{st} semester which would be a prerequisite for the award of degree.
