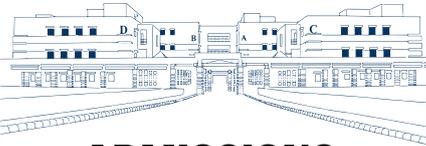

STUDENT DISCIPLINE REGULATIONS

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Student Discipline Regulations

1. Short Title, Application and Commencement

- (1) These Regulations shall be called the Capital University of Science and Technology Student Discipline Regulations, 2025.
- (2) These Regulations shall apply to all students of the University. The conduct of students shall be governed by the institutional rules, regulations, and codes of conduct duly enacted and promulgated by the competent authority of the University, as provided under the Capital University of Science and Technology Act, 2015.
- (3) The University Discipline Committee, duly constituted in accordance with the University's governance framework, shall be vested with the legal and administrative authority to investigate allegations, conduct inquiries, render determinations, and impose disciplinary sanctions on any student found to be in violation of the University's Code of Conduct.
- (4) The jurisdiction of this authority extends to all acts committed on the physical premises of the University, as well as to all conduct related to academic, administrative, extracurricular, or examination-related activities that are organized, facilitated, authorized, or supervised by the University or its officials, whether such activities take place on or off campus.
- (5) It shall come into force at once.

2. Definitions

- (1) in these regulations unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context: -
 - (a) "Authority" means an authority as defined in the University Act under its various sections.
 - (b) "Appeal Committee" means a committee constituted by the Vice Chancellor to adjudicate appeals against the decisions of the Discipline Committee.
 - (c) "Competent Authority" means the Vice Chancellor of the University or a senior dean/professor/official nominated by him.
 - (d) "Committee" means the Discipline Committee of the University.
 - (e) "Campus" means the premises of the Capital University of Science and Technology.
 - (f) "Chairperson" means the Chairperson of the Discipline Committee of the University.

- (g) “Dress Code” means the prescribed attire as defined by the University Authority for presence on campus.
- (h) “Director Student Affairs” means the Director Student Affairs of the University.
- (i) “Examination” means an activity which shall be counted towards the final grade of a student.
- (j) “Expulsion” means a temporary or permanent removal of a student from the University roll.
- (k) “Employee” means a person employed by the University.
- (l) “Fine” means a financial penalty imposed by a University authority.
- (m) “Head of the Department” means the Chairman of the department in which the student concerned is registered.
- (n) “Invigilator” means a person deputed for the conduct and supervision of examinations.
- (o) “Identification card” means an official identification card issued by the University authority to a registered student.
- (p) “Prosecutor” means a University official responsible for conducting investigations.
- (q) “Registrar” means the Registrar of the University.
- (r) “Rustication” means the expulsion of a student for a predefined period.
- (s) “Suspension” means the temporary suspension of a student’s registration.
- (t) “Student” means an individual formally admitted to the University whose registration remains valid.
- (u) “Teacher” means a person engaged or employed by the University for teaching purposes.
- (v) “University” means the Capital University of Science and Technology.
- (w) “Unfair Means Committee” means a committee constituted by the Vice Chancellor to adjudicate cases of academic dishonesty or cheating.

3. The Discipline Committee

- (1) The Committee shall be constituted by the competent authority and notified by the Registrar for a term of three years, and shall consist of the following members:
 - (a) A senior faculty member not below the rank of Associate Professor, to serve as Chairperson;

- (b) The concerned Head of Department (ex officio);
 - (c) The Director of Student Affairs (ex officio);
 - (d) A female faculty member not below the rank of Assistant Professor;
 - (e) An Associate Professor or the Director Administration;
 - (f) A faculty member not below the rank of Assistant Professor, to serve as Secretary of the Committee, with voting rights.
- (2) The quorum for any meeting of the Committee shall be three members. Decisions of the Committee shall be made by a majority vote of the members present.
 - (3) The Committee may initiate proceedings upon receipt of a written complaint submitted by any teacher or authorized University official through the respective Head of Department or the Director Student Affairs, which is subsequently forwarded to the Chairperson of the Committee by the competent authority.
 - (4) Any student or employee may submit a written complaint concerning a disciplinary violation to the Office of the Director Student Affairs. Following a preliminary investigation, and subject to approval by the competent authority, the complaint may be referred to the Chairperson of the Discipline Committee for further action.
 - (5) Subject to the severity of the misconduct committed by a student, the competent authority, upon recommendation by the Director Student Affairs or the Chairperson of the Discipline Committee, may suspend the student's registration to prevent further academic or disciplinary harm to the University.
 - (6) A student under suspension shall be prohibited from participating in any academic activities or accessing University premises until the conclusion of the disciplinary proceedings.
 - (7) The disciplinary proceedings must commence within seven (7) days from the date of receipt of the disciplinary complaint by the Office of the Chairperson of the Discipline Committee.
 - (8) The Secretary Discipline Committee shall notify the alleged student(s) the date, time, and venue of the disciplinary proceedings, as well as the nature of the alleged misconduct and the potential consequences thereof, unless such information has already been communicated.
 - (9) A personal hearing of the alleged student is mandatory for concluding the disciplinary findings. The student shall not be represented by any third party, including counselors or parents, except where the competent authority grants prior written permission in exceptional circumstances. The hearing shall be conducted in a fair and impartial manner,

affording the student a meaningful opportunity to present evidence, be heard, and respond to the allegations.

- (10) If the alleged student fails to attend the disciplinary proceedings without prior notice or a valid excuse acceptable to the Chairperson, the student shall be suspended forthwith. The student may be granted one final opportunity to appear before the Committee, and the imposed suspension shall remain in effect until the conclusion of the disciplinary proceedings.
- (11) The decision shall be announced by the Secretary of the Discipline Committee, through a speaking order, within 48 hours of the hearing, once it has been approved by the competent authority.
- (12) If a student is rusticated for a semester or longer, the suspension shall take effect as determined by the Discipline Committee, and no adjustment of fees shall be permitted.
- (13) A rusticated student shall be prohibited from entering the University premises or availing any of its facilities during the period of rustication. Any violation of this restriction shall constitute a separate act of indiscipline and may result in permanent expulsion.
- (14) If a student is rusticated during a semester in which he holds an active registration, all enrolled courses and laboratory sessions shall stand withdrawn, and no fee adjustment or refund shall be granted.
- (15) A student who has been permanently expelled from the University may be issued an academic transcript; however, he/she shall not ordinarily be entitled to a certificate of good moral character.
- (16) A student who is fined by the Discipline Committee an amount of Rs. 25,000 or above, or is rusticated for a semester or longer, shall be ineligible for the award of any scholarship, academic honor, or medal awarded by the University.
- (17) A student who has been expelled shall not be eligible for readmission to any program of the University unless expressly permitted by the competent authority. If an expelled student gains admission by concealing or falsifying information, the University reserves the right to cancel the admission at any stage, upon verification of the facts.

4. Penalties for Acts of Indiscipline

- (1) All penalties for acts of indiscipline shall be proportionate to the nature and frequency of the misconduct and shall be imposed only after a due process conducted by the Uni-

versity Discipline Committee, to ensure fairness and transparency in disciplinary actions, respecting the rights of the accused while maintaining institutional integrity.

(2) **Minor penalties** are intended for less severe acts of misconduct and first-time offenses. These penalties serve as warnings or corrective measures aimed at reforming behavior without causing severe disruption to the student's academic progress or campus life. They are classified as:

- (a) **Warning or censuring:** A formal admonishment to a student, highlighting the misconduct and advising corrective action. The warning letter shall be placed in the student's disciplinary record, detailing the misconduct and outlining the consequences of repetition.
- (b) **Placement on disciplinary probation:** The student is officially placed on probation, during which any further misconduct may result in a more severe punishment.
- (c) **Monetary fine:** A financial penalty imposed on the student, commensurate with the offense, intended as a deterrent for misconduct. It could be any amount depending upon the gravity of misconduct but less than Rs. 25,001/-
- (d) **Withholding of certificate of good moral character:** The University may withhold issuing a certificate that vouches for the student's good conduct.
- (e) **Withdrawal of institutional privileges:** Temporary or permanent removal of privileges such as access to the library, sports facilities, outdoor camps, or participation in extracurricular activities.
- (f) **Withholding of examination results:** The results of examinations may be withheld until the student has complied with disciplinary requirements or served a penalty.
- (g) **Suspension from academic participation:** Debarring a student to take part in academic activities including labs/lectures/presentations etc., from one class to a maximum of one week.

(3) **Major penalties** are reserved for serious or repeated violations and may significantly impact a student's academic career and campus life. They are classified as:

- (a) **Enhanced monetary fine:** A financial penalty starting from Rs 25,000/- to a maximum of Rs 200,000/-, reflecting the gravity or repeated nature of the offense.
- (b) **Cancellation of hostel accommodation:** Revocation of the privilege to reside in University hostels, requiring the student to arrange off-campus accommodation.
- (c) **Cancellation of financial benefits and concessions:** Withdrawal of scholarships, stipends, fee concessions, or any financial assistance previously granted.

- (d) **Suspension of admission and ban on campus entry:** Temporary removal from the University rolls and prohibition from entering the campus for a period exceeding one week.
- (e) **Cancellation of examination results:** Annulment of results for examinations already taken, requiring the student to retake exams or courses.
- (f) **Rustication for a specific period:** Temporary expulsion from the University for a specific period after which the student may be allowed to re-enroll.
- (g) **Expulsion from the University:** Permanent expulsion from the University shall constitute the termination of the student's registration and under normal circumstances readmission, including under a new registration number, shall not be permitted.

5. Acts Constituting Indiscipline

- (1) The following acts, whether committed willfully, negligently, or as a result of incitement, shall constitute violations of student discipline and may result in disciplinary and/or administrative action:
 - (a) **Violation of the University's dress code and identification policy:** Persistent non-compliance with the official University dress code, as prescribed and updated from time to time, or repeated violation of University identification requirements.
Maximum punishment: Two weeks expulsion or a fine of Rs. 10,000 or both
 - (b) **Defiance or disobedience of University officials:** Willful refusal or failure to comply with lawful and reasonable instructions duly issued by an authorized University teacher or administrative personnel.
Maximum punishment: Two weeks expulsion or a fine of Rs. 25,000
 - (c) **Abetting or facilitating an unauthorized entry:** Knowingly allowing, enabling, or facilitating the entry of individuals who have been banned, expelled, or identified as a threat to campus safety or order, into University premises, in violation of institutional security protocols.
Maximum punishment: Two weeks expulsion or a fine of Rs. 25,000
 - (d) **Use of indecent, abusive, or foul language, or derogatory gestures:** Engaging in the use of vulgar, offensive, indecent, or abusive language, or making disrespectful, derogatory, or obscene gestures towards any member of the University community, outside the classroom or laboratory, but within the University premises, thereby undermining the social and moral norms and ethical standards of conduct expected

within the University.

Maximum punishment: Two weeks expulsion or a fine of Rs. 30,000 or both

- (e) **Acts of moral turpitude or disorderly behavior:** Engagement in conduct that is unethical, indecent, or disruptive to the University's community standards, including but not limited to loud disputes, harassment, intimidation, theft, or any other behavior that adversely affects the safety, dignity, or well-being of others.

Maximum punishment: Two weeks expulsion or a fine of Rs. 50,000 or both

- (f) **Inflicting or attempting to inflict insult, injury, or threat:** Any act or attempted act that causes or intends to cause physical injury, insult, intimidation, or verbal or emotional threat to another person, whether direct or indirect, shall be deemed a violation of the University's code of conduct.

Maximum punishment: One semester expulsion or a fine of Rs. 100,000 or both

- (g) **Unauthorized audio video recording and its publicity:** No person shall capture photographs, audio, or video recordings of any student, employee, or University-related activity within classrooms, laboratories, cafeterias, meetings, or functions held on University premises or at off-campus locations under the University's jurisdiction, nor shall such recordings be published, distributed, or shared via electronic, print, social media, or any other communication platforms, with the intent to malign or defame the University, its students, or its officials.

Maximum punishment: One semester expulsion or a fine of Rs. 100,000 or both

- (h) **Dissemination of hate speech or sectarian/religious intolerance:** Any conduct involving the propagation or encouragement of hatred or discrimination against individuals or groups based on religion, ethnicity, region, or language, whether expressed verbally, in writing, or visually.

Maximum punishment: One semester expulsion or a fine of Rs. 100,000 or both

- (i) **Planned disruption of classrooms academic environment:** Any attempt, whether organized or individual, to disrupt the academic environment during lecture or lab sessions by any means, including but not limited to interference with classroom equipment or IT devices, hooting, disruptive behavior, disrespect towards the instructor, or any other action that undermines the sanctity of the academic setting.

Maximum punishment: One semester expulsion or a fine of Rs. 100,000 or both

- (j) **Impersonation, fraud, or deception:** Misrepresentation of identity, submission of false or misleading information, or engagement in any form of deception with the intent to obtain undue academic or administrative advantage.

Maximum punishment: Two semesters expulsion or a fine of Rs. 200,000 or both

- (k) **Use of student organizations for political purposes:** Utilizing, directing, or allowing any University recognized student organization, society, or club to promote,

endorse, or support the objectives, activities, or agenda of any political party, group, or movement, whether directly or indirectly. This includes organizing events, disseminating political materials, raising funds, or engaging in campaigns on behalf of such entities within University premises or under the University's name.

Maximum punishment: Two semesters expulsion or a fine of Rs. 200,000 or both

- (l) **Sale, distribution, or use of intoxicants and narcotics on campus:** Possession, use, sale, distribution, purchase, or sharing of alcoholic beverages, narcotics, controlled substances, or any intoxicating or mind altering agents is strictly prohibited within University premises and during any University sponsored events. This prohibition also extends to being under the influence of such substances while on campus or engaged in any University related activity, whether conducted on or off campus.

Maximum punishment: Two semesters expulsion or a fine of Rs. 200,000 or both

- (m) **Unauthorized use of University property:** Unauthorized use of University facilities, equipment, services, or resources, whether physical, digital, or intellectual, is strictly prohibited. This includes accessing, occupying, or utilizing any University property without prior approval from the competent authority, or using such resources in a manner that violates institutional policies, compromises safety, disrupts operations, or causes loss or damage to University assets.

Maximum punishment: One semester expulsion or a fine of Rs. 100,000 or both

- (n) **Willful damage to University property:** Intentional damage, destruction, defacement, or vandalism of any University-owned property, including but not limited to buildings, infrastructure, equipment, furniture, fixtures, signage, or other physical assets.

Maximum punishment: One semester expulsion or a fine of Rs. 100,000 or both

- (o) **Possession or use of weapons on campus:** Bringing weapons onto campus, carrying on one's person, storing in a vehicle, or using any item classified as a weapon including, but not limited to, firearms, knives, explosives, or any other object capable of causing harm. Possession or use of such items, regardless of intent, shall constitute a grave violation and may result in immediate suspension, expulsion, and referral to law enforcement authorities where applicable.

Maximum punishment: Permanent Expulsion

- (p) **Obstruction or disruption of University operations:** Engaging in any act that disrupts, obstructs, or delays the academic, administrative, or operational functions of the University which includes, but not limited to, organizing or participating in unauthorized protests, sit-ins, blockades, or other forms of physical or verbal obstructions that interfere with the normal functioning of classes, examinations, official meetings, or access to University facilities.

Maximum punishment: Permanent Expulsion

6. Framing of Charges and Conduct of Disciplinary Proceedings

- (1) Following the initial investigation, the Prosecutor shall frame charges in accordance with Section (5) of these regulations, and the alleged student(s) shall be duly informed of the maximum potential penalty if found guilty.
- (2) The Discipline Committee is bound to proceed on the basis of the framed charges, and any penalty imposed shall not exceed the penalty prescribed for those specific charges.
- (3) The members of the Discipline Committee shall hold a consultative session to reach a unanimous decision, where possible, in line with the University Code of Conduct, to uphold institutional discipline and deterrence.
- (4) Upon the conclusion of the proceedings, the Discipline Committee shall determine, by unanimous or majority vote, whether the student is 'guilty' or 'not guilty,' based solely on the evidence brought forward in support of the framed charges.

7. The Appeal Committee

- (1) The Appeal Committee shall comprise three senior professors of the University, with the Registrar serving as an ex officio member and Secretary. Any member of the current Discipline Committee who has participated in the original decision shall not be a part of the Appeal Committee. The Appeal Committee shall decide an appeal by majority vote, and the quorum shall consist of all three members.
- (2) A student penalized by the Discipline Committee may challenge the decision before the Appeal Committee within seven (7) days from the date of its announcement.
- (3) The Registrar shall receive the appeal from the aggrieved student, and the appeal must be processed within seven (7) days from the date of submission.
- (4) The Appeal Committee shall adjudicate the appeal without requiring any new evidence, ensuring that no procedural flaws were committed by the Discipline Committee, that the punishment awarded under the framed charges is commensurate with the act of indiscipline, and that no injustice has been done to the aggrieved student.

- (5) If the Appeal Committee observes any irregularity or deficiency in the proceedings of the Discipline Committee, the case may be referred back to the Discipline Committee for additional proceedings, if necessary, which must be completed within seven (7) days from the date of the Appeal Committee's hearing.
- (6) The decision of the Appeal Committee shall be communicated in writing to the appellant by the Registrar within 48 hours from the date of the hearing, and the same shall be conveyed to all concerned for implementation.
- (7) Subject to the powers vested by the University Act in different authorities, the decision of the Appeal Committee shall be final and binding on all concerned.

8. Examination Violations

- (1) Examination misconduct includes cheating, impersonation, or any other unfair means used during exams. The following acts, whether committed willfully, negligently, or through incitement, shall constitute examination violations:
 - (a) **Unauthorized assistance during examination:** Any act whereby a student communicates, assists, or conspires with another during an examination which includes whispering, sharing notes, or using non-verbal cues to help or receive help.
 - (b) **Possession or use of unauthorized material (books, notes, photocopies, etc.):** Possession or use of unapproved reference materials during an exam, including cheat sheet, textbooks, or notes, unless explicitly allowed by the exam instructions.
 - (c) **Writing irrelevant material or appeals to examiners:** Writing unrelated content, including personal messages, requests for marks, or emotional appeals, on the answer sheet that are not related to the exam questions.
 - (d) **Tampering with answer books:** Altering, removing, or replacing any part of the official answer script, including tearing out pages or making unauthorized additions.
 - (e) **Possession or use of communication devices (e.g., mobile phones):** Possession or use of mobile phones, smart watches, or any electronic devices capable of communication or information storage during the examination.
 - (f) **Substitution of official answer sheets:** Replacing or attempting to replace the official answer book with a pre-written or counterfeit one, whether prepared in advance or during the examination.
 - (g) **Exchange of answer sheets:** Swapping answer sheets with another student before, during, or after the exam, either voluntarily or covertly.

- (h) **Misrepresentation of identity (wrong roll number):** Writing an incorrect or another student's roll number or name on one's own answer book with the intent to deceive.
- (i) **Cheating with threatening or abusive conduct toward invigilators:** Engaging in cheating while simultaneously exhibiting aggressive, abusive, or threatening behavior toward exam invigilators or staff.
- (j) **Disobeying examination staff on duty:** Refusing to follow the instructions of examination staff, including those related to seating, conduct, time management, or materials allowed in the hall.
- (k) **Delayed entry to examination hall:** Arriving late to the examination hall without valid justification. Repeated violations may result in penalties, including fines or disqualification.
- (l) **Creating disturbance around the examination venue:** Causing noise, unrest, or any form of disruption that affects the peaceful conduct of the examination for other candidates.

9. Unfair Means Committee

- (1) Whenever a case of examination violation is reported, it shall be referred to the Controller of Examinations (CoE), who shall place all such cases before the Unfair Means Committee (UMC), constituted for this purpose by the competent authority. The committee shall consist of at least three members and shall be chaired by the Controller of Examinations.
- (2) The UMC shall make its decision after giving the alleged student an opportunity for a personal hearing. If the student fails to appear before the UMC on the announced date and time, an ex parte decision shall be made.
- (3) Based on the nature and gravity of the cheating, the UMC may announce its findings in writing after obtaining approval from the competent authority. The findings of the UMC shall be final, and the result shall be announced accordingly.

10. Penalties Specific to Examination Misconduct

- (1) Penalties for acts of academic dishonesty shall be proportionate to the severity and recurrence of the offense. Such penalties shall be imposed only following a formal inquiry conducted by the Unfair Means Committee (UMC), in accordance with due process. The inquiry shall ensure procedural fairness, transparency, and respect for the rights of the

accused, while upholding the academic integrity and disciplinary standards of the University.

- (a) **Oral warning:** A verbal caution specifically related to minor examination offenses.
- (b) **Written warning or censuring:** A formal written reprimand recorded in the student's file related to examination behavior.
- (c) **Cancellation of answer sheet:** The answer sheet of the student in question is invalidated and not graded.
- (d) **Cancellation of course enrollment:** The student's enrollment in the course where misconduct occurred may be cancelled by awarding F or W grades.
- (e) **Cancellation of mid-term examinations:** The student's mid-term exam results are annulled, affecting the overall course assessment.
- (f) **Cancellation of one complete semester:** The student's results for an entire semester may be cancelled, often accompanied by rustication or re-examination.
- (g) **Rustication for a specific period:** Temporary suspension from the University specifically due to examination misconduct.
- (h) **Expulsion from the University:** Permanent removal from the University due to serious or repeated examination offenses.

11. Exception Clause

- (1) Any development, scenario, or occurrence not expressly addressed within the defined powers, functions, or penalties of the University Discipline Committee or the Unfair Means Committee shall not invalidate any decision rendered in response thereto. Judgments issued by either committee in such cases shall be deemed valid and binding, provided they are made in good faith, fall within the general scope of the committees' mandates, and receive formal approval from the competent authority.

12. Authorization to Impose Fine

- (1) Various authorities of the University, including Deans, Heads of Departments (HoDs), the Director of Student Affairs (DSA), and teachers, are authorized to impose fines not exceeding Rs. 25,000/- and other minor penalties to maintain discipline in classrooms and on university premises

(2) The details of the fines and disciplinary measures that may be imposed without formal disciplinary proceedings, but with due diligence and by ensuring utmost fairness, are provided below:

The University Dress Code

13. Dress Code for Male Students

(1) Desirable

- (a) Trousers
- (b) Shirt
- (c) Tie
- (d) Dress Shoes with socks
- (e) Shalwar Kameez clean and properly pressed with waist coat

(2) Admissible

- (a) Decent, clean and pressed jeans with T-Shirt
- (b) Shalwar Kameez clean and properly pressed
- (c) Summer Sandals with a strap running behind the heel

(3) Not Allowed

- (a) Shorts, Cut-off jeans, multi pocketed faded, torn and skin fitted jeans/trousers
- (b) T-shirts with messages of any kind
- (c) Chappals/slippers of any kind
- (d) Bandana's, caps, etc.
- (e) Vests of any kind
- (f) Long hair, pony tails, etc.
- (g) Ear rings, chains, wrist straps, bracelets, etc.

14. Dress Code for Female Students

(1) Desirable

- (a) Traditional Shalwar Kameez and dupatta

(b) Chappals/shoes

(2) Admissible

(a) Jeans with Kurta/shirt

(b) Light Jewelry like nose pins, ear studs and rings on fingers

(3) Not Allowed

(a) T-shirts with jeans

(b) Sleeveless shirts of any kind

(c) See through and skin tight dresses

(d) Heavy makeup

(e) Flashy/heavy jewelry, pazeb's, etc.

15. The University ID Card

(1) A student of the university is required to have a valid university identity card (ID card) and its display is mandatory while on the campus.

(2) The Entry to the Examination Hall, Library, Labs and other premises will only be allowed, if a student possesses university ID card and his/her registration in the semester is intact.

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
